We have transformed seven boring, dull underpasses into stunning outdoor pieces of art to be enjoyed by everyone.

Each piece of art was created based on feedback and inspiration from the local community. They celebrate the environment and community of the town and locally important figures, as well as some of the passions of its residents.

In this guide you will find out more about the artists who created the artwork and the story behind each piece.

There are also some fun facts, quiz questions and activities for all ages you can do along the way.

The trail was funded by Wychavon District Council, Droitwich Spa Town Council, Safer Streets funding from the West Mercia Police and Crime Commissioner and the Government's UK Shared Prosperity Fund.

A huge thank you to everyone who responded to the community consultation and took part in the design development workshops, as well as those on the project steering group. OC HOW TO EXPLORE the Trail

The best way to explore the trail is by walking, cycling or wheeling. If you find walking difficult, then you can also enjoy the trail by car, although on-street parking isn't easily accessible in every location so please park considerately and plan ahead.

If you are exploring the trail on foot or by wheels then on the opposite page is a map of a suggested circular route you can take, starting from either Droitwich Spa Railway Station or the car park by Westlands Community Centre.

PLANNING your route

If you do not fancy using our suggested route then you can plan your own.

We recommend you use the What 3 Words app and Google Maps to navigate your way around and design your own route.

- Visit www.what3words.com. You can also download the app by searching for What 3 Words in the App or Google Play stores.
- Type in the unique set of words shown below each underpass in the column opposite. Remember to include the full stops.
- Then click navigate. You can then choose Google Maps or another of the suggested apps to create a route by car, foot or wheels.

About THE ARTIST

Graffiti art specialist **Andrew Mills – otherwise known as 'Title'** – has produced work for a number of leading brands including Nike and Microsoft. During the Covid-19 pandemic he created a mural in Tamworth in tribute to Captain Tom, who raised millions for NHS charities, to mark his 100th birthday.

About THE ARTWORK

Title worked with young people from local youth group **DAFFY** to review the responses to a residents' survey and come up with a design. The group were keen to celebrate the community of the Westlands and for the design to be bright, colourful and positive. Nature was a popular theme from the survey and aspects of this can be seen throughout the design.

About THE ARTWORK

The pair worked with pupils from St Joseph's Roman Catholic Primary School on this design. It was again inspired heavily by the nature theme that came through from the community consultation, as well as pupils' love of the sea and marine life.

About THE ARTWORK

After reviewing feedback from the community consultation, the group from The Cabin at Droitwich Spa Hiah School was keen the desian should celebrate the communitu. Droitwich's history and provide positive inspiration. An Alice in Wonderland theme was chosen as a creative and inspiring way to bring together different stories from the town. The design features famous people from Droitwich Spa's past, as well as local landmarks. There is also a crown as a tribute to HM Oueen Elizabeth II as the artwork was produced in the year of her Platinum Jubilee.

DID YOU SPOT?

Famous comedian, writer and actor Rik Mayall can be seen playing the role of the Mad Hatter. Rik was born and grew up in Droitwich Spa. His best known work includes The Young Ones, Blackadder and Bottom. Rik passed away in 2014.

The dog in the design isn't just any dog. She is called Bella and is the therapy dog from the Cabin at Droitwich Spa High School. The Cabin is used by the whole community for a variety of reasons including adult education programmes.

The head on one of the playing cards is that of John Corbett, who built a great fortune building Europe's largest salt business during the 1800s, earning him the nickname locally of The Salt King. He built the Chateau Impney, which can also be seen in the artwork, for his French wife. John was a philanthropist, who reinvested some of his profits into improving conditions and wages for his workers. He represented Droitwich Spa in Parliament as a Liberal from 1874 to 1892.

HUNTERS WAY

About THE ARTIST

A Worcester based female duo who go by the name of **Chroma Chameleons** and are committed to bringing colour and pattern to the streets. Their previous work includes giving a facelift to Worcester's old Co-op building and they are also responsible for the loan shark mural on Westlands Community Centre.





The artists worked with pupils from Westlands First School, who asked for a swimming/water theme as they use the underpass to walk to nearby Droitwich Leisure Centre for their weekly swimming lessons. They also drew inspiration from the art deco posters used by railway companies to advertise trips to the coast during the 1930s.

About THE ARTIST

Illustrator, street artist and arts workshop aficionado **Toddjerm** is the creative genius behind this artwork. His previous work has included pieces for streaming giant Netflix and communications company Virgin.



About THE ARTWORK

This is the biggest of all the designs stretching 30 metres on each side of the underpass. Community workshops were held locally to come up with inspiration for the design. The design celebrates the strength of the Westlands community as well as celebrating the 'sport for all' theme, with the King George V Playing Fields and Droitwich Spa Leisure Centre nearby.

About THE ARTIST

This design was a joint project between Curtis Hylton and Andy 'Dice' Davies.

Andy has painted for the Sky Arts Studio, The Holst Museum and Arsenal Football Club and supported young people from DAFFY to create a separate mural at Westlands Community Centre.

Curtis is a much sought-after artist whose work explores environmental issues. He has painted across the UK and internationally.

About THE ARTWORK

The pair worked with young people from Westacre Middle School on the design. It reflects the importance of nature to local people which came through strongly in the residents survey. Pupils also wanted a cool, space inspired theme for part of the design, which is reflected in the alien creatures landing and discovering all the wonders of Droitwich Spa.

DO YOU KNOW?

What species of rare bird is featured on part of the wall?

Answet: The Golden Oriole. The same size as a blackbird, the Golden Oriole is a secretive creature that stays high up in trees and has a distinctive fluting whistle. It was included in the design after one was spotted locally in May 2021.

About THE ARTIST

7th Pencil has over 12 years experience creating public art projects. Former clients include Heineken and Bloomsbury, publisher of the Harry Potter books.



Droitwich Spa High School students helped inform this design. Mirror images of women past and present lead the artwork, with their thoughts, memories and inspiration flowing through the piece.

One wall speaks to the natural and contemporary elements of the town, joined by the flow of the longwave signal. The other wall features a woman nostalgically recalling the town's history, with the flow referencing the subsidence following brine extraction as well as the uneven journey of time. The molecules of salt from her head lead via the salt worker statue to the historic brine pump, and the railway station.

CAN YOU SPOT?



The water and fountains which are a reference to Droitwich Spa Lido. The Pamela May 2 community boat is a link to Droitwich Spa's canals which were re-opened in 2011.

DID YOU KNOW?

The longwave radio signal is a reference to Droitwich Transmitting Station, situated on the edge of the town. Installed in 1934, the site is home to the BBC's most powerful long wave transmitter. During the Second World War the transmitter was used to send coded messages, read during normal programmes, to the French Resistance.

The nearby railway station was built on land donated by Salt King John Corbett, who features on the Paddock Hill underpass, and opened in 1899.

WHO IS THAT WOMAN?



The contemplative woman is a representation of Mother Earth and highlights the importance of us looking after our green spaces and ourselves by experiencing and enjoying them.

Droitwich Spa has some beautiful awardwinning parks including Lido Park, Vines Park and St Peters Field, which are represented by the trees, flowers and wildlife in the design.
